The Importance of Library Advocates

We are facing a pivotal point in the history of our Morro Bay Library. For those who don't know, the Morro Bay Library is a County operation that operates under a building lease from the city of Morro Bay. The Library's lease with the city of Morro Bay is up in July 2010.

Some other facts for you to know:

- 1) The building that houses our current Library was built through the Friends fund-raising efforts and was gifted to the city of Morro Bay in 1987.
- 2) The City provides custodial support for the Program Room in the Library and maintenance of the parking lot area adjacent to the Library.
- 3) The City gains revenue from the rental of the Library's Program Room.
- 4) The County provides over \$600,000 annually for library operations which include maintenance, custodial, and upkeep of the grounds. This investment by the County directly benefits our community.
- 5) The Morro Bay Library is good for our local economy and tourism industry. A 2006 study by the Urban Institute concluded, "*public libraries are positioned to fuel not only new, but next economies because of their roles in building technology skills, entrepreneurial activity, and vibrant, livable places.*"

As we contemplate the new lease, we can't help but ask this question:

How much will the new lease agreement between the City and the County cost to keep library services in Morro Bay?

Since we have no idea, the County and Friends wanted to begin negotiations with the City this summer so that the Friends could be prepared to raise the necessary capital that may be required to resolve this next lease.

Raising money in dismal economic times can be challenging. We feel, however, that beginning lease negotiations now is a proactive way to use long range planning in securing library services for the future in Morro Bay.

On May 16, the Friends Board of Directors released the report, "**Our Vision of Morro Bay Library's Future – Where do we want to go?**". This report incorporates the feedback provided by the many participants who attended the 1st Countywide Library Summit in November, 2007, or completed a survey or attended one of our community meetings earlier this year.

Have you read it yet? If not, you can either check it out at the Morro Bay Library or download it at the Friends website, www.morrobayfriendsoflibrary.org

One of the basic messages from the community (shared in this report) was that they wanted the Library to provide more books, media, computers, quieter reading and work areas. In order to meet community demands, the Library needs more space. In order to get more

In Memoriam by Jude Long

Our beloved Helen Bowen Hileman passed away March 18, 2008, at her storybook red home here in Morro Bay where she had lived and raised her family since 1951. She was our SLO County Children's Librarian from 1962-1982 and she created and performed in many children's activities and programs here at the Morro Bay Branch. National recognition came her way when she created the Dial-A-Story program where children could call and listen to her tell stories. In the late 40's, when she was living in the Long Beach area, Helen even drove their Bookmobile.

Her commitment to the community was evident in her membership in the Estero Bay Women's Club, Junior Matrons, Toastmistress Club, AAUW, Estero Bay Republican Women's Federation, and Friends of the Morro Bay Fire Department.

The Morro Bay Friends of the Library were fortunate to have Helen serve as President for three years from 1988 to 1990. She also served as the chairperson for the Friends Building Committee in the early 80's and, most recently, she was a member of the Library Vision Committee in 2006-2007. She originated the Junior Friends, a Library support group for children that was active for several years in Morro Bay. She was instrumental in starting many Friends of the Library organizations throughout our county. I attended many statewide and nationwide conferences with Helen and she patiently mentored me through a maze of numerous dilemmas. We presented the Friends story of the building of the Morro Bay Library at one of these conferences and Helen and the Friends received accolades for their achievements.

Helen Hileman was a Morro Bay Treasure who was always there for the Library and for the Friends of the Library! Her kindness, dedication and generosity were appreciated by all who knew her and she will be greatly missed.

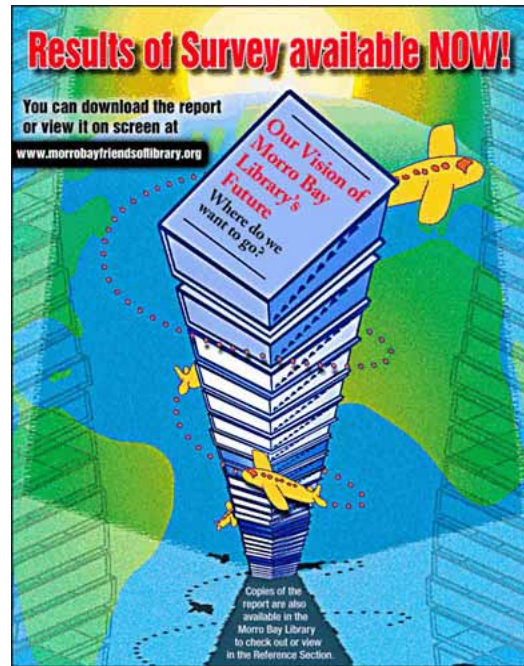

Why The Morro Bay Library is Relevant

The Morro Bay Public Library started as a “one bookcase library” back in 1922. It opened for business at its present location at 625 Harbor Street in December, 1985, largely through the efforts of the Morro Bay Friends of the Library and the support of the larger community. Since then it has evolved into a dynamic community institution dedicated to the advancement of knowledge. It welcomes a diverse clientele and is continuously adapting to meet the needs of the community.

The Morro Bay Public Library is more than just a building on the corner of Harbor and Shasta that houses books, technology and people. It is a place where you can sit and read a newspaper or a magazine. Card holders can check out a book, borrow a video or DVD, use the internet or gain Wi-Fi access. In addition to its services for adults, the library provides weekly storytelling and summer reading programs for children. Our library staff is knowledgeable and always eager to help.

A recent survey conducted by the Friends found a clear relationship between those who love books and those who love libraries. Not surprisingly, the library symbolizes a haven for readers and researchers and all who have inquisitive minds and creative spirits. If you love knowledge, the library is the place for you, your neighbors and friends. Every time my ten-year old grand-daughter, Mackenzie, visits, she looks forward to visiting the library to find her “book friends” and I like fostering her “world of imagination.”

Our library holds a central and often emotional place in my mind and in

the minds of many of our friends and patrons. The special virtues and rewards of

libraries—and the Morro Bay Library in particular—is summed up nicely by the American poet, Archibald MacLeish:

*But what is more important in a library
Than anything else
Than everything else
Is the fact that it exists.*

Like other libraries, the Morro Bay Public Library has found its costs increasing while its operating funds are decreasing.

So, why be a volunteer at the Morro Bay Library? Among the volunteers I interviewed, most mentioned that they loved reading, but Barbara Riddell said, "I really felt that libraries mattered. To me, public libraries are the rock bottom essence of how a community promotes a literate population. I found myself with free time and thought what better way could I use my talents?!"

After retiring from teaching, Joan Petersen connected her love of libraries with a love for education. "After all," she pointed out, "There is a close relationship between the two." She made volunteering a first commitment.

Ric Deschler, our volunteer with an accounting background, said that he really loves going to the library. After a while he saw a fairly extensive need for assistance in the book room. "I'm a physical kind of guy who doesn't mind doing manual labor," he said.

I personally like being around books and working in a friendly environment.

Joan Petersen started out shelving, but eventually worked her way up to Book Sales Volunteer Coordinator. Riddell cited her efforts at book sales and keeping the "Seven Day Express Books" in good order.

In addition to his duties in the book room during sales, Deschler is treasure of the "Friends" and on the board of directors, too. As Vice President I'm learning how to write articles for "Among Friends." I also shelve books, sort magazines and help with book sales.

All of the volunteers expressed how much they enjoy their service to the library. Petersen said, "I really get excited about being part of a successful book sale. Barbara Riddell expressed how much she enjoyed sharing the library's twentieth anniversary with Morro Bay. "What a great party we threw!" she exclaimed.

An article about volunteers in service to the library could not be complete without mentioning the late Grace Melton. A consummate leader, the institutional memory of the "Friends," she had a splendid vision for the future. Riddell remarked, "I think she must have committed *Robert's Rules of Order* to memory. She always got it straight."

Riddell remembered the late Gil McCann as the driving force behind the book

sales at the Farmers' Market. "He provided storage for the books, did an amazing amount of grunt work, and we simply have not been able to replace him," she added.

Joan Petersen appreciated Gil for his wonderful assistance with youth books, and remembers Ransome Rideout (now residing in Santa Cruz) who played such an important role in the development of the library; Judi Horner, the staff person who so generously welcomed and trained new hands; the late Helen Hileman, another "founding mother;" and Jean White who has put so much of herself into the book sales.

I remember the late Berenice Glinsky for her tireless, generous hours sorting books.

Ric Deschler pointed out that Jane Bailey started the current organization twenty-five years ago.

These are just a handful of wonderful people who have given so much of themselves. Karen Robert said that she just could not begin to put names to everyone who serves or has served, but she thanks them all. She did make special mention of Joan Petersen, who, using her bicycle, devised "one of the most creative methods ever for earning money for the 'Friends,' " Biking for Books.

All of us would agree with Deschler's statement that we have the greatest good fortune to work with an outstanding librarian, Jude Long, and her wonderful staff.

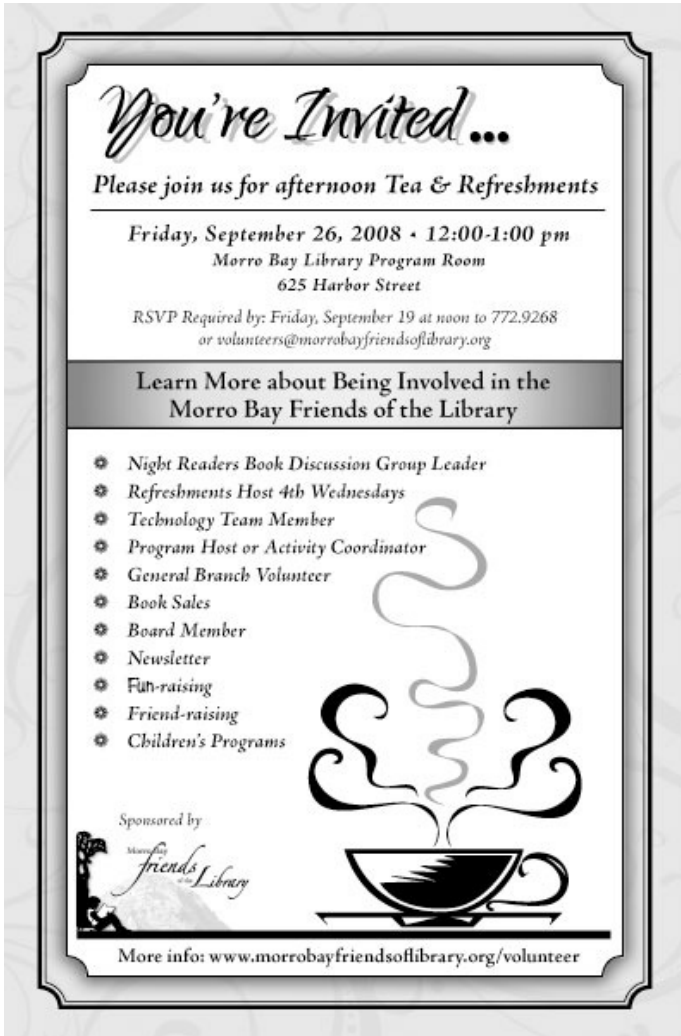
