More than books ... It's Our Future!

I still fondly recall the excitement and sense of adventure I felt when my parents first gave me permission to visit our public library — the Panorama City Library in the San Fernando Valley — on my own.

To this very day, I can walk into any library and feel right at home.

Of course, public libraries have experienced many changes, especially since I was a kid. Some 50 years ago, my childhood library was full of books, card catalogs and a few magazines and newspapers. Today, our public libraries are still full of books, but now cassettes, videos, CDs and DVDs compete for shelf place. Gone or going are the old card catalog dressers, replaced by computers and Internet access.

Since those days, I have come to believe that throughout our ever-quickenning pace of evolving knowledge and changing priorities, the most important question we must never stop asking ourselves is “What are we teaching our children?”

How and what we teach our children has everything to do with where our tomorrows will lead us. Our libraries are opportunities to instill in our children a love of reading, which can help them develop the skills needed for a lifetime of learning.

Not only preserving, but keeping our public libraries strong and healthy over the long run, may be more important to the vitality of our democracy than anything else we may ever do around the world.

Throughout San Luis Obispo County, many worthy endeavors are experiencing challenging times. With budget cuts having implications yet to be felt or fully understood, we continue to be forced to make choices. We must choose between investment and prevention-type programs vs. after-the-fact programs that treat symptoms, rather than directly addressing problems.

Here's a choice. You can choose between exercising and eating fruits and vegetables; or you can sit in front of the TV while having a soda or a beer with a sweet or salty snack. What choices are many of us making? The irony of this is that while public health officials across the country concern themselves with an obesity diabetic epidemic, there are millions of impoverished Americans who continue to suffer from hunger.

Predictions about the future can be

found everywhere. Today, there are those who claim the Internet will make the public library obsolete. Fast and easy information seems to be at our fingertips. The Internet fits well with the present “faster is better” way of living. Yet, by the good grace of common sense, the State of California recently began to restrict the sale of fast foods (salads not included) and sodas to our children while they are in attendance at our public schools.

What might be the long term unintended consequences on our kids disconnecting from the public libraries in favor of the Internet? Is it even remotely possible that by becoming too dependent on fast and easy information that our children eventually encounter some sort of negative impact on their minds and the way they think and relate to each other? Just look at the way too much fast food (and lack of exercise) has been affecting the health of our bodies!

The Foundation for San Luis Obispo County Public Libraries believes that strong libraries help build, nourish and support our community by providing a rich environment for learning and the appreciation of knowledge.

By expanding hours and maintaining a current collection, our public libraries will continue to be beacons for raising self-esteem in many wonderful ways.

If we intend to have our public libraries in good repair, open more hours, stocked with current materials and technologies, our community needs to support our public libraries in a way similar to the way we have come support public radio.

The Foundation believes that our libraries are “More than books ... They're Our Future!” What better way to discover new things, connect with our community and enrich our lives through our relationship with our public libraries. We believe that as a centralized advocacy Public Benefit Corporation our Library Foundation will continue to afford the opportunity for our industrious Friends groups to invest a portion of their valuable time by becoming stakeholders in a countywide unified endeavor to help bring new resources to the San Luis Obispo County Library System. Together we will unite library supporters across our county by focusing our passion and talents on raising
